Dear President Obama and Secretary Kerry:


As Members of the North Texas Congressional delegation, we are calling for an immediate travel ban to the United States from Guinea, Liberia, and Sierra Leone. The prompt implementation of this policy would greatly reduce the chances for Ebola to spread in the United States beyond the current case in Dallas, Texas. We have seen firsthand the significant impact that just one confirmed case of Ebola is having on our North Texas community and all available precautions, including a travel ban on affected countries, must be taken to stop the spread of the disease.

Last year, the State Department issued approximately 13,500 visas to residents of Guinea, Liberia, and Sierra Leone. Many US visas are valid for up to five years and would have been issued long before the outbreak of Ebola in West Africa and presently remain valid. The United States should immediately suspend all visas for travel to the United States and cease issuing new visas from Guinea, Liberia, and Sierra Leone until the Ebola epidemic in West Africa has significantly subsided or ended.


